Emotions and learning go hand in hand. So what strategies exist to help children better manage their emotions? Children can experience a range of emotions in the classroom, influenced by a variety of factors from individual differences to external factors, such as home and family life. It is said that there are six basic emotions: anger, disgust, fear, happiness, sadness, and surprise. Children may feel anger when they are unable to understand something, or happiness when they receive a good mark on a test. Since it was shown that putting your feelings into words reduces the intensity of emotions and promotes well-being, teaching children to label their emotions helps them to manage them effectively.
